Claire Santos-Daigle – “Photo Dating by Fashions”

At Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library (365 F Street) Auditorium

In the field of genealogy some people inherit beautifully preserved collection of photographs while others have only Xerox copies or low quality photos found on the internet. Those genealogist with photos in good condition can arrive at an approximate date taken by the physical properties. Then there are the photographs where the clues of the physical properties are not present and what remains are the clothes and objects in the image.

Claire Santos-Daigle has presented the topic of Photo Dating by photographic processes in the past in her presentation, "Photo Dating 101". Back by popular demand, she will be speaking on the topic of Photo Dating with emphasis on fashions. This topic will briefly cover the physical properties, then how to research fashions by covering fashion eras, fashion terms and resources.

Claire has been digitally restoring photographs for 12 years. She realized through those years that she had developed a talent for determining the date of a photograph by repeated exposure, and began to seriously research how to date a photo, and uses her collection of photos to illustrate and provide this information, free of charge and accessible to genealogists on her website.

Claire Santos-Daigle is the sole proprietor of "Photos Made Perfect," licensed in the state of California, in Chula Vista. With her husband Michael, she became involved with digital photo restoration when Michael started his genealogy in 1992 through 1996, when they began restoring family photos with free unknown software Michael found on the internet. Family and friends kept saying "you should start a business" and in 1999 she did, with her husbands' technical skills and support, and her art skills, life experiences and marketing background.

Member 5 Generation Pedigree Charts

Many CVGS members filled out a five generation pedigree chart when they joined, or submitted an updated chart later. CVGS plans to digitize these five generation charts and add them to the Ahnentafel files on the CVGS website. The CVGS website is crawled by Google and other search engines, and distant cousins may find CVGS members in this way because they share one or more ancestors.

The process to digitize and display the charts is simple – there are 31 spaces on the chart, and the names, dates and places for those 31 ancestors of a member will be added to a family tree program and an Ahnentafel Report will be created. Living persons will be made anonymous, and the submitter's names will not be used. The Ahnentafel Report will be provided to the CVGS Webmaster, who will add the names to the Surname Index and put the Report on the website with a unique identifier.

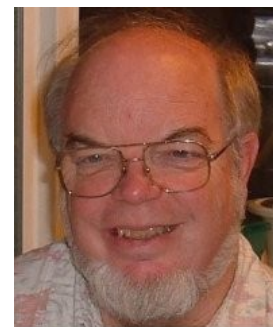
CVGS 2 March Workshop Review - "Learning to Blog"

"Learning to Blog" by Susi Pentico was presented with 9 in attendance. It was well received and people were going home to learn more and hopefully start blogging. They were sent the links to start and become bloggers. We will be doing this again in the May Workshop (with DearMyrtle's "More Blogging for Beginners" CDROM) because the attendees wanted more information. We also had two attendees become members. Virginia finally picked a title for her blog.

CVGS Research Group Review – by Randy Seaver

We had 12 attendees at the 13 February 2013 meeting of the Research Group, which met in the library Auditorium.

In the first hour, Randy discussed the Find A Grave website, how to navigate in the New York Land Records on FamilySearch, looked at his Ancestry DNA autosomal test results, and provided attendees a look at the FamilySearch Family Tree, including the known problems of duplicate persons and multiple sets of parents.



In the second hour, the attendees shared what they have been doing recently, and brought up questions or problems from their research:

- * Shirley has browsed the New York Land and Probate collections on FamilySearch, but has not found much for her New York families. She has been corresponding with another Wright researcher who insists that his William Wright is also Shirley's William, and that Shirley should change her online family tree. Shirley has evidence convincing to her that this should not be done. She also asked "Why do people do DNA tests without posting a family tree?" Great question!
- * Susi has been looking at New York and Pennsylvania probate records on FamilySearch, and has found some of her families in guardianships that name the parents and the guardian, but don't name the children involved for some reason.
- * Mary Lou was cleaning up her garage and found a storage box with Civil War era trading cards with soldiers photos, including signatures. The names are from her 2nd-great-grandfather's regiment from Livingston County, N.Y. She wants to share these with descendants if possible, and would love to find one that her ancestor traded to someone else. She wondered what she should do. The group suggested posting on the surname and county mailing lists on Rootsweb and Genforum, and to look for a GAR post in Livingston County that might be able to help.
- * Caroline was a guest who found Susi's blog online and came to the meeting.
- * Kitty has been making autosomal DNA cousin contacts. One cousin is going to Ireland to take pictures of homesteads and towns there.
- * Joanna has been finding lots of ancestors, and their records, with John's help on Wednesday mornings.
- * Gary has dropped his Roff in New York research for now, and is focusing on his Blay line, which lived in Canada. He also asked where he can find Revolutionary War records. The group suggested the Ancestry and FamilySearch record collections, the complete Pension and Bounty Land Warrant files on Fold3, and the DAR website.
- * John is working on his Civil War veterans, and has found a descendant of a soldier in the same regiment.
- * Sam is working a lot in Find A Grave finding burial locations of his relatives. He asked if there was a "master list" of resources to check to make as complete a search as possible. Randy promised to send him one for both traditional and online resources.

February 27th Program Review – Hank Z. Jones, Jr. on “Palatines”

Hank Z. Jones, Jr. always has a fun and informative presentation, and he did not disappoint on 27 February with his talk on "Tracing the Origins of Early 18th Century Palatine and Other Emigrants."

Hank, of course, "wrote the books" on Palatine Emigration to Ireland and the United States (and we have them in the Family Research section of the Chula Vista library). He started out noting that "Palatine" was a generic term in the early 18th century for a person of German origin. Many of them came from the Pfalz region on the Rhine called the "Palatinate."

After discovering his own connections to Irish Palatines, he began work on his book for the Palatine Families of New York, making a comprehensive study of the 846 families that arrived in 1710, then tracing as many as possible to their ancestral homes in Germany, and document the results. Other books treated later arrivals to New York, and also Palatines to Pennsylvania. He found that "to find one tree, you have to search the forest," because many of the families came from one location and knew, worked and socialized together when they arrived in America.

Hank noted that he had made many mistakes, and from those mistakes learned a number of lessons, including:

- * "An immigrant is an immigrant..." - and the research process is the same no matter when they migrated.
- * Don't look overseas too early - investigate the American resources first.
- * American colonial churchbooks have significant data and are ripe with clues as to European origins
- * They came in groups - the saving grace of his 40-year Palatine project. Study the names of neighbors, baptismal sponsors, and witnesses to marriages, wills and deeds for clues
- * Study the juxtaposition of names on all available unalphabetized lists on which your ancestor appears.
- * German churchbooks are a prime source in establishing your Palatine roots
- * Other German sources to be utilized in your research include emigrant permission lists, court records, oaths of allegiance, deeds, probate records, historical and genealogical libraries, and German periodicals.
- * Be open to all spelling variations of German names.
- * Follow your instincts as well as your intellect.

Hank's handout provided a great bibliography of books to help trace the origins of 18th century German emigrants.

Top Ten Characteristics of a Good Genealogist, by Randy Seaver

What does it take to be a “good” genealogist? Here's my Top 10 list:

1. Practices life-long learning - genealogy and family history requires continuous learning by the participants in order to be successful, in books, periodicals, websites, video, seminars, conferences.
2. Has research and organizational skills - has repository and online research skills, able to find information, save it in a logical location, and be able to find the items that were saved. Uses charts, reports and software to stay organized.
3. Knowledgeable about genealogical resources - knows, or knows how to find out, the availability and limitations of home sources, repository sources, and online sources.
4. Practices genealogical standards - knows Genealogical Proof Standard principles, cites sources, analyzes process and results, critically evaluates evidence, and reaches sound conclusions.
5. Has good computer skills - able to work in genealogy software, navigate the Internet, use technology, and effectively search genealogy databases.
6. Exhibits patience and persistence - understands record limitations and accessibility, follows projects to a logical conclusion
7. Can multi-task - works on several projects in different stages of development at the same time.
8. Willing to share - engages with other researchers in personal conversation, email or message board postings, social media, online family trees, and participates in society activities.
9. Has a passion for genealogy and family history - loves the challenge of the "hunt" and conveys that passion to family members, colleagues, readers, and clients.
10. Solve the most difficult puzzles knowing they need to go beyond the individual ancestor being studied to look at the web of family and community relationships, including historical and social context.

Dearl Glenn (1934-2013), Rest In Peace! by John Finch

Dearl Glenn died on the 6 February 2013 in Chula Vista. He was a long term, Honorary Life Member of the Chula Vista Genealogical Society, and held the office of Treasurer, and then Library Liaison, for many years.

Dearl volunteered countless hours at the library as a docent to our research collection, tending to the books, and improving the genealogical forms and the member pedigree charts held in the filing cabinets. He met with members and the public interested in family research and provided guidance and advice. He was a very personable man and expressed himself in a manner reflecting his rural Americana values. Quick witted and somewhat outspoken in his opinions, but he was always mindful of the issues of others.

A veteran of the Korean War, Dearl was proud of his service as a career United States Marine. He had seen action at the Chosen Reservoir, a decisive battle in that conflict with many casualties that earned the survivor's the moniker, "The Chosen Few". He also served in Viet Nam.

A simple goodbye would not suffice in the loss of a man of this stature. So, Old Friend, in an appreciation for all you accomplished, I say to you, Semper Fi.

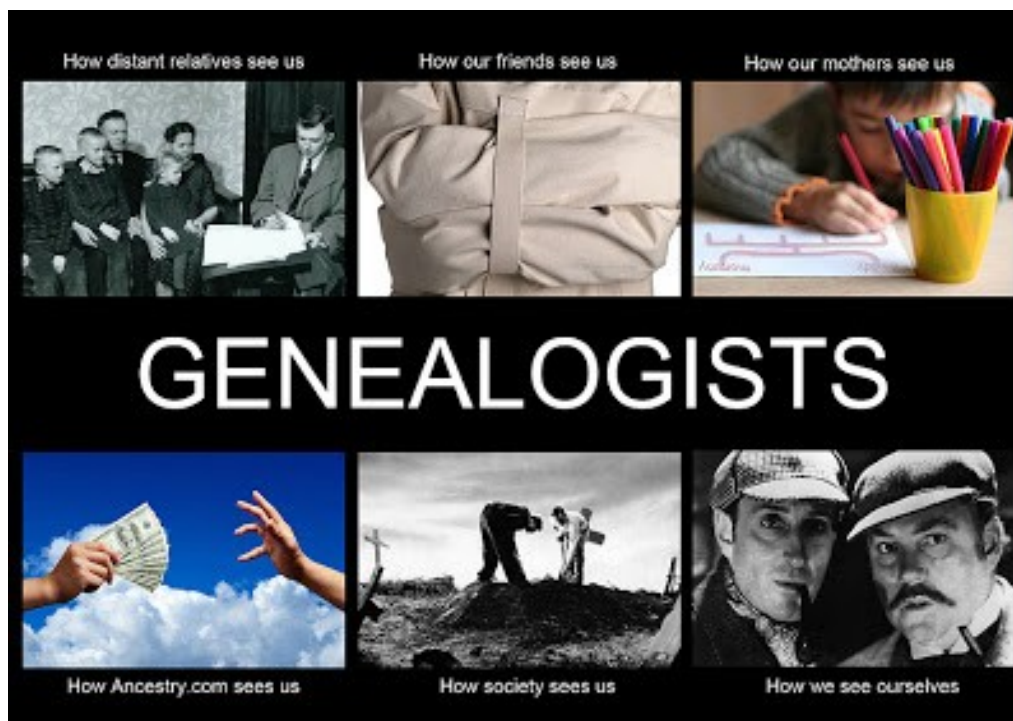
