

I managed to attend classes in 12 of the 20 different time/day slots, which may be a record for me, including presentations by nationally known speakers Thomas W. Jones, Elizabeth Shown Mills, Harold Henderson, Warren Bittner, Robert Charles Anderson, Marian Smith, Judy Russell, Julie Miller and Bill Ruddock. Perhaps the most useful talk was Bill Ruddock's, about “Colonial New York Genealogy.”

The Exhibit Hall had about 70 exhibitors, including the “big” company displays of Ancestry.com, FamilySearch.org, and MyHeritage.com. The software vendors were there also, as were many smaller companies and quite a few genealogical societies. I

There were very few major genealogy product announcements at this Conference. The most newsworthy announcement was the “Record Detective” feature for subscribers to the MyHeritage Family Tree and Data plans. The “Record Detective” features finds information in MyHeritage record collections without the user searching for it. MyHeritage recently added all of the United States Census records for 1790 to 1940 to their record collections, so this becomes very useful. In addition, they access the NewspaperARCHIVE collection, the Find A Grave collection, WikiTree profiles, and more. I had my picture taken at the MyHeritage exhibit with Daniel Horowitz and two of the Record Detectives.



Linda and I did not go out of the Hotel until the last night, because of Linda's mobility problems. We did see an Elvis impersonator show at our hotel, and on the last night we enjoyed dinner at a local restaurant with one of our daughter's best friends, Eileen, who is now a medical device company representative.

CVGS Research Group Review – by Karen Yarger

The CVGS Research Group met at noon on Wednesday, May 8, in the library conference room, with 12 attendees. In the absence of leader Randy Seaver (away at the NGS Conference), the meeting was moderated by Shirley Becker, who shared a number of internet resources to help us in our genealogical research:

* The Internet Archive site <http://archive.org/index.php> is a digital library collection of videos, music, and - of prime importance to us genes – over four and a half million texts. And it's all FREE. There are, for example, the 1790-1930 U.S. census records, military war records dating from the Revolutionary War, and so much more. Shirley also reminded us of the Way Back Machine on this site: an amazing way to access old sites that 'no longer exist' (but they do!).

* Since we were discussing census records, Shirley also presented several other sites on which to find information: <https://familysearch.org/> and others, including <http://www.heritagequestonline.com/>, which we can access for free through the Carlsbad Library with a library card. We can even just Google "1900 US Federal Census" for more options. John Guy said you can type in (surname) Jones Family Tree for several options to search. Don't forget to try Google!

As we discussed various ways to search census records, Gary Brock reminded us that our CVGS home page <http://cvgenealogy.org/> has blank US census forms from 1790 to help us read the various categories (see FORMS).

* Shirley also gave us a tour of another free site, USGenWeb <http://usgenweb.org/>, with a large collection of maps and resources listed by state. Sometimes we just have to be reminded that these sites are there!

The second hour was a problem-solving session, with attendees' issues discussed:

* Virginia Taylor, in researching land records, wondered about the term "perch", which after group detective work, we determined was an obsolete term for an area of land (160 perches = one acre).

* Bethel Williams wondered why her great grandfather was listed twice on the 1900 federal census, once at home and 2 days later at his daughter's. We suspected he was a laborer who may have worked from his daughter's address during the week.

* Kayle Guy was having trouble verifying the SSN and date of birth of her relative Margaret McCool. The group worked together to determine that she was listed as Margaret A. Mitchell, and found several records for her, including a photo of her gravestone. Shirley also suggested she could request SSN info by checking <http://rootdig.com/ss5/>

* Jean Taylor wondered how to respond to a post, and learned how.

* Gary Brock had a nice surprise when he discovered in his mother's estate papers four certified copies of his Roff grandparents' birth, marriage & death certificates.

* Diane DeVincenzo had help from John Finch in finding her grandfather's WWII draft records, even though the spelling was different within a few years.

* Karen Yarger wants to research her colonial ancestors to see if they fought in the Revolutionary War. Mary Lou gave some tips on accessing DAR records.

* Members Mary Lou Montez and Helen Sauer both have Gaylords in their lines. Is there a connection?

Which got us to thinking that the June 26 annual picnic would be a good opportunity to meet up with other members who share our family surnames. We plan to have big poster maps (one US and one Europe) with a way for each attendee to list their name and show where their ancestors were from. Getting together with others to share possible relatives will be fun! The CVGS Picnic will be held at Gary and Wanda Brock's home, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. We are asked to bring a dish representing your heritage, a pedigree chart and \$5. May 29th Program Review – Shirley Becker's “New York Research and Resources”

CVGS member **Shirley Becker** discussed "**New York State Research and Resources**" at the 29 May 2013 CVGS monthly program meeting with 30 persons in attendance.

She started with an overview of New York colonial history, from the Dutch in 1624 in New Amsterdam and fort Orange (now Albany) to the English in 1664, through the Revolution to the modern New York state of today. In the process, she showed how counties developed over time from 1683 to 1830, when the present counties were as they were then. The patterns of settlement were typical for colonial America - along the coast and along waterways. There were settlements up the Hudson River to Albany, and then east along the Mohawk River. Eventually, the Erie Canal was built to open up western New York to settlers.

Shirley also described the different land grants made by the New York Land Commission between 1786 and 1791 after the Revolutionary War, notably the Phelps and Gorham Purchase, the Morris Reserve and the Holland Land Company Purchase, all in western New York. The land purchasers then sold lots to settlers from New York and New England.

Shirley also discussed state census records (available every ten years from from 1825 to 1925, except 1892 instead of 1895), church records, military records, and probate records.

Local records are divided among counties, cities and towns, villages and hamlets. There are 62 counties, 62 cities, 932 towns, and over 4,200 local government entities. Each town is supposed to have a town historian, and sometimes there are also county historians. The historians have knowledge of the town records, cemetery records, land records, probate records, and more.

The USGenWeb sites for the counties often have indexes and transcriptions for local records - start at . An inventory of New York newspapers is available online at www.nysl.nysed.gov/nysnp/index.html. The New York Probate Records, 1629-1971 collection and the New York Land Records, 1630-1975 collection are online in FamilySearch record collections (<https://www.familysearch.org/search/collection/list>), but without indexes. Most counties have indexes to use to find record volumes and pages, and then the volumes themselves.

This was an informative presentation about the difficulties and opportunities for performing New York research and the resources available in repositories and online databases.

Computer Basics Class Completed

Shirley Becker and Gary Brock led the “Computer Basics Class” on three Thursday in May, with six attendees. The students learned how to create file folders, naming and renaming file folders and files, moving the file folders to different locations, and how to find lost folders or files. was the last class for computer basics. They learned how to use shortcut keyboard commands (like Control-Z) and how to right-click the mouse to perform various tasks. In the last session, the students spent their time making a timeline on one of their ancestors, using previously learned lessons.

Two CVGS \$500 Scholarships Awarded – by Susi Pentico

The CVGS Board of Directors approved awarding two \$500 scholarships to worthy Sweetwater Union High School District seniors in 2012. This year the topic was. "**How My Ancestors Affected My Educational Journey.**" Applicants presented an essay of 300 words on this topic, a Five Generation Chart and a Cover Letter introducing themselves and what school they attend. We received 30 Scholarship Applications for the Scholarship Committee to evaluate last February.

Two Scholarships were presented at the Awards Ceremony at East Lake High School on Monday, 3 June.

The two \$500 Scholarship winners receiving the awards were: Alexzander Hurst and Natalie Garcia.

Alexzander said he “...has his Great Great Grandfather's diligence, his Great Grandmother's dedication, and his Mom's determination.” He stated that getting an education was an Educational Journey he was looking forward to continuing. That is 3 D's we should always consider in our quests.

Natalie also has applied these efforts to her life as she learned about her families past and she plans to graduate from UCR in 2017 with a Bio-Medical Engineering Degree then move on to a Medical School being able to work for discoveries for Cardiovascular disease.

With continued community support we hope to continue this event into the future. The Seminars the Society plans bring in the funds to give out the Scholarships. In the first three years of this program, we awarded scholarships to three Chula Vista High School students. We then felt we had it figured out, and had enough community support, to increase the Scholarship value and the number of participants. This was our first year to cover all of Sweetwater Union High School District. What we will be able to do in the future will depend on the community support at our Seminar's throughout the year.

Genealogy News for May

- **Do you have New York ancestors?** If you do, you'll want to check out the free guide to New York ancestors available at FamilySearch.org. In this guide, you will find a series of research articles packed with helpful ideas for tracing ancestors in [New York City](#), its five boroughs, 57 counties, and hundreds of towns throughout the state. [New York Online Genealogy Records](#) will help you quickly discover what is available online. There are articles about using [New York passenger lists](#), the [New York Foundling Hospital](#), and [orphan trains](#). There is information about German, Irish, Italian, Jewish, and Polish organizations in [New York](#). You will also find strategies about tracing [American Indian tribes](#) that once inhabited the area, old migration routes and ports such as [Ellis Island](#), the [Erie Canal](#), and the [King's Highway](#), and learn tips about using New York genealogy collections at archives such as the [New York Public Library](#) the [New England Historic Genealogical Society Library](#), and the [Family History Library](#).
- The **"Who Do You Think You Are?"** television series on NBC was canceled after three seasons. Producers Lisa Kudrow and Dan Bucatinsky have since negotiated a deal with TLC Network and now have announced the premiere date for a new season: July 23 at 9 PM Pacific. Ancestry.com will remain as the sponsor. TLC will air eight one-hour episodes in the new season. The celebrities featured this year include: Christina Applegate, Kelly Clarkson, Cindy Crawford, Chris O'Donnell and Zoey Deschan.
- **Mocavo.com announced the launch of [Genealogy Karma](#).** Modeled after Random Acts of Genealogical Kindness (RAOGK, now defunct), it will empower the Mocavo community and connect researchers all around the country. If you're looking for documents, records, or photos from an ancestor who lived far away, we will connect you with family history volunteers who can do this research for you in other cities. Likewise, if you'd like to give back to the Mocavo community and have a little time to donate, you can sign up as a volunteer.

New or Updated FamilySearch Record Collections

FamilySearch.org now has over 1,570 record collections – for **FREE** - on their website. You can see the list at <https://www.familysearch.org/search/collection/list>. Put a place name in the Search Field to see records available for a specific state or country. Some collections are indexed and searchable, and some collections have to be browsed (meaning you go page by page, although many records collections have indexes to help you find specific records). Notable collections from the past month that were added or updated include:
