Terrance Connors on "Surveying and Land Records"**

Terry Connors is the August 28th program presenter with the topic of "Surveying and Land Records." He is the current San Diego County Surveyor. With the County Tax Assessor's office.

In his talk, he will review the Assessor's office; the Recorder's office (which deals with vital records certificates, deeds and patent searches); the Tax Collector's office; the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors; and the County Surveyor's office. For the latter, he will discuss Federal Land Maps, 1853-1900, Private Survey Maps, and Other Resources (Non-recorded Maps, and Road Books).

Terry was born and raised in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and moved to San Jose, California in 1963. He graduated from Campbell Union High School in 1965, attended two years of Junior College before joining the United States Naval Reserves at Alameda. Terry flew Anti-Submarine Warfare aircraft from 1969 to 1973. He worked for Santa Cruz County in 1969 as a rear chain-man on a survey crew, and went into private industry in 1978. He was licensed by the State of California in 1982. Terry was a principal in a consulting engineering firm from 1986 to 2000, ran his own business from 2000 to 2007, and joined San Diego County in 2007 as the County Surveyor. He is married with two children.

“A Century of Service – A Genealogist’s Perspective”

This year's Fall Seminar will focus on our military through four wars in our early history: the War of 1812, the Civil War, the Spanish American War and World War I. The **FREE, all-day seminar** will be held on **Saturday, September 7 at the Bonita-Sunnyside Branch of the County Library (4375 Bonita Road) from 9:30am to 4:30 pm.**

Expert speakers will cover the history and events of each war and how we can learn more about our ancestors' enlistments, service records and pensions and more.

- Karl Zingheim, the historian of the USS Midway Museum will address the War of 1812;
- Marti Lewis, former president of San Diego's African-American Genealogy Research Group (SDAARG), will cover the Civil War;
- Susi Pentico, CVGS Education and Seminar Chair and noted CVGS lecturer, will present the Spanish American War;
- John Finch, U.S. Navy retired and past President of CVGS, will address World War One.

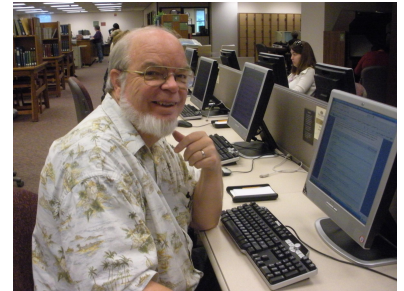

CVGS Research Group Review – by Randy Seaver

We had 16 attendees at the CVGS Research Group meeting on **Wednesday, 10 July 2013** at the Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library.

In the first hour, Randy highlighted several genealogy news items and interesting videos, including:

- * The next CVGS workshop is on Saturday, 3 August, titled "RootsMagic 6 Revisited." This workshop will look at many features of the RootsMagic software, including the Version 6 updates.
- * KPBS, the San Diego PBS station, has posted a video on YouTube, titled "[The Central Library Moves Hidden Treasures Out Into the Public Eye](#)," about the move to the new downtown San Diego library. The views of the old records in the basement are tantalizing!
- * The "Who Do You Think You Are?" television series returns on Tuesday, 23 July (9 p.m., 8 p.m. Central) on the TLC Network (Cox Channel 36 in San Diego area). There will be eight weekly episodes.
- * The [Ancestry.com YouTube Channel](#) has many instructional videos on using Ancestry.com searches, Member Trees, Family Tree Maker software, and more.
- * Tessa Keough's excellent "[Your Genealogy Pie](#)" video on YouTube highlights how a genealogist can participate in a number of activities to be well-rounded.
- * Ancestry.com announced they will scrap the "Old Search" feature and integrate some of those features into "New Search." Randy showed how the results for a given search are identical, and described some of the "New Search" advanced features. Some attendees disagreed.



In the second hour, the attendees asked questions, and shared their research successes, including:

- * **Karen S.** has lots of Revolutionary War soldiers, and wants to obtain their records (CMSR, Pension Files, etc.). She asked if [www.Fold3.com](#) was useful for this. The answer was YES, since Fold3 has the largest, and easiest to search and use, collection of Revolutionary War records, especially the complete Pension Files.
- * **Ralph** pursued obtaining his father's U.S. Navy discharge papers, commendations and medals from the National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis. After about six months, he received them. He brought two shadow boxes that display the information - they are beautiful. He had the shadow boxes made by a man in Tijuana who has a small business doing picture framing. Ralph mentioned the "Medals of America" site (<http://www.medalsofamerica.com/>). A second set of medals and pins can be obtained by a family member if the original medals have been lost.
- * **Shirley** reported a success using the MyHeritage Record Match system. She searched for her parents names, and found their marriage date and location in a newspaper obituary using the MyHeritage data subscription. This was new information for her - she had been searching for it for a long time.
- * **Virginia** talked to the American Civil War Ancestors organization (<http://www.acwancestor.org/>) at the SCGS Jamboree. She found out that they would find Civil War records at the National Archives for a fee. She paid them \$25 for Compiled Military Service Records for her ancestor, with the records provided in image format on a CDROM.
- * **Gary** mentioned the Memories in Print website (<http://www.memories-in-print.com/>), which is designed to create a coffee-table style book about a person's life memories.
- * **Susi** recommended the website, Elephind (www.Elephind.com), which is an online aggregator of historical newspapers on freely available websites. We did several searches for brick wall ancestors for the attendees.
- * **Joanna** asked about a list of immigration ports of entry. The group suggested using the FamilySearch Research Wiki (https://familysearch.org/learn/wiki/en/United_States_Emigration_and_Immigration) and then look for information for specific states) to find more information.

The next meeting of the CVGS Research Group will be **Wednesday, 14 August 2013 at 12 noon** in the Conference Room of the Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library (365 F Street, Chula Vista).

July 31st Program Review - "Women Heroes of the American Revolution"

At our July 31 general meeting, CVGS Member **Karen Yarger** presented a collection of stirring, and occasionally humorous stories, of our feminine American patriot forebears to over 30 eager listeners.

We discovered things about well-known colonial women that we didn't know, like Martha Washington following her husband George to each of his winter encampments, including Valley Forge.

We also heard the inspiring story of Sybil Luddington, "the female Paul Revere", who was only 16 when she rode 40 miles (twice as far as Revere) to rouse the militia. And about the 64-year old widow who rode horseback from Virginia to North Carolina to care for her son, wounded in battle.

We learned about Margaret Corbin, who was on the battlefield with her husband, and took his place at the cannon when he was killed. She was severely wounded, and was the first woman to receive a soldier's pension. She is currently the only soldier of the Revolutionary War buried at West Point.

Other stories of spies, camp followers and mothers defending their homes were inspiring additions to our knowledge of America's War for Independence.

August 3rd RootsMagic Workshop Review

Randy Seaver led a "RootsMagic 6 Revisited" discussion and demonstration at the August 3rd Workshop at Bonita-Sunnyside Library with about 15 attendees. Topics included working with Problem Alerts, the Gazetteer, creating quality source citations, and interfacing with the new FamilySearch Family Tree. There was a question-and-answer time also – with discussion of different charts, lists and reports, web searching, finding and fixing broken media links, program and file options. As an example, Randy created a person, added a spouse and children, then added Facts, Sources and Media to show how his process works.

To interface with the FamilySearch Family Tree, Version 6.3 of RootsMagic is required. If you want to work in FamilySearch Family Tree, be sure that you are a registered user of FamilySearch (<https://www.familysearch.org/register/>) - it's FREE and easy (but you will need to know your login and password information).

Genealogy News for July

- The 1921 Canada Census is now available (with browse images access at this time), on **Ancestry.com**. An index may be available in a few months. Users need a World subscription, or a Canadian subscription, to Ancestry.com in order to access the images.
- **MyHeritage** announced a new service, called **Treasure Family Photos**. The purpose is to encourage people to learn more about their family's history from their old photos and to preserve these precious artifacts online for future generations. MyHeritage.com now has the largest family photographs sharing web site.
- FamilySearch announced they have reached a milestone in their collection of Family History Books found at <https://books.FamilySearch.org>. More than 100,000 books have now been scanned and published online by the partnership of the **Family History Library, Allen County Public Library, Brigham Young University Harold B. Lee Library, Brigham Young University Hawaii Joseph F. Smith Library, Church History Library, Houston Public Library – Clayton Library Center for Genealogical Research, and the Mid-Continent Public Library – Midwest Genealogy Center**.
- The U.S. National Archives and Records Administration's web site has long contained the Archival Research Catalog (ARC). It has been a catalog of all digital items available on the www.nara.gov web site. Now the National Archives and Records Administration has announced that the ARC is being shut down. However, you shouldn't see much of a loss. The contents of the ARC are simply being moved. You can still search descriptions and digital content using the same web site's Online Public Access search at <http://www.archives.gov/research/search/>.
- <http://www.familytreedna.com/> announced that the FamilyFinder autosomal DNA test price will stay at \$99 for competitive reasons (the 23andMe price is \$99).
- The Periodical Source Catalog (PERSI) will be updated and available on the **FindMyPast.com** site with searchable listings of genealogical periodical titles and authors.

New or Updated FamilySearch Record Collections

FamilySearch.org now has over 1,635 record collections – for **FREE** - on their website. You can see the list at <https://www.familysearch.org/search/collection/list>. Put a place name in the Search Field to see records available for a specific state or country. Some collections are indexed and searchable, and some collections have to be browsed (meaning you go page by page, although many records collections have indexes to help you find specific records). Notable collections from the past month that were added or updated include:

- Many Brazilian church record collections were added as browse-only collections.
- North Carolina County Marriages, 1762-1979 (845,664 indexed records, with images)
- North Carolina Estate Files, 1663-1979 (166,177 indexed records, with images)
- California Great Registers, 1866-1910 (3,310,884 indexed records, no images)
- Massachusetts Passenger Lists, 1820-1891 (889,777 indexed records, with images)
- Ireland, Tithe Applotment Books, 1814-1855 (753,924 indexed records, with images)
- United States Public Records Index (70,822,824 indexed records, no images)
- England, Sussex Parish Registers, 1538-1910 (520,192 indexed records, no images)
- Texas County Tax Rolls, 1846-1910 (1,242,633 indexed records, with images)
