Next Computer Group Meeting – 18 May 2016

The next Computer Group meeting will be on Wednesday, 18 May 2016 at the Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library (365 F Street in downtown Chula Vista, Calif.). There will be a “Beginning Computer Genealogy” class at 10:15 a.m. in the Conference Room, followed by the regular “Computer Group” meeting in the Computer Lab from 12:30 to 2 p.m., both led by Shirley Becker.

This is an experiment. We are giving it three months. Class will start at 10:15 a.m. in the Conference Room and go until 11:45 a.m. when we will break for lunch. It is called a “Beginning Computer Genealogy” group. If you have a laptop, you should bring it. Gary Brock will be demonstrating very basic computer tasks such as how to find tutorials and use them. We will move to the computer lab at 12:30 p.m. and stay until 2 p.m. Basic genealogy tasks are planned, such as going to a website, copying an item and placing that item in your database. We will use the lab computers at this point with a kind of fake database set up in Microsoft Word. We will delete those databases when we leave the lab. Hopefully, the attendees will have some basic knowledge at that point to follow on the computers. We want their input on what they would like to learn.

The expectation is that the attendees will follow up at home by practicing on things they will learn in class. In two months, if they practice we will try for more advanced things in the lab. If it doesn't work that way, we will answer requests for assistance and we will discontinue the extra class.

April 27th Program Review – Randy Seaver

On Wednesday, 27 April, CVGS member **Randy Seaver** presented "**The Ten Best FREE Genealogy Websites**" to about 40 attendees at the Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library Auditorium.

He started with a **Top Ten** countdown, highlighting the free features of each website. The ten free websites were (in 10 to 1 order):

10) Family Tree Webinars (<http://familytreewebinars.com>) -- 60 to 80 webinars each year, over 335 in the Archive, presented by noted genealogists on a range of topics. You need to register for each webinar. They are to watch live or in the archive for one week, and then go behind the subscription wall (\$50/year).

9) Ancestry.com (<http://www.ancestry.com>) -- has over 700 FREE databases and indexes (see <http://search.ancestry.com/search/group/freeindexacom>), The Learning Center (see <http://www.ancestry.com/cs/HelpAndAdviceUS>) has a Family History Wiki featured articles, the Ancestry.com blog, and Ancestry Videos (on their YouTube channel). Any registered user can create and edit an Ancestry Member Tree (but cannot attach records to it without a subscription). Ancestry Library Edition is FREE to access at subscribing libraries and FamilySearch Centers. Save information to your flash drive or email them to yourself.

8) Cyndi's List (www.CyndisList.com) -- a free, volunteer driven website with over 330,000 genealogy links to websites in over 200 categories. Readers can report a broken link and submit a new link.

7) Joe Beine's Death Indexes (www.DeathIndexes.com/sites.html) -- a FREE volunteer-driven set of websites with links to free and subscription sites with genealogy records. Links are provided to Death records, birth and marriage records, military records, passenger list records, naturalization records, and German records.

6) U.S. GenWeb (www.USGenWeb.org) -- FREE genealogy information by many volunteers, organized by states and counties. Information may be maps, text, lists, indexes, links; has U.S. GenWeb Archives (<http://usgwarchives.net/>)

5) RootsWeb (www.rootsweb.ancestry.com) -- FREE genealogical information contributed by many volunteers; website owned by Ancestry.com. Content is Searchable by Search Engines (<http://searches.rootsweb.ancestry.com/>); Beginner's Guide to Genealogy Research (<http://rwguide.rootsweb.ancestry.com/>); User-Submitted Family Trees – WorldConnect (<http://wc.rootsweb.ancestry.com/>); Free Web Pages (<http://www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~websites/>); Mailing Lists (<http://boards.rootsweb.com/>); and Message Boards (<http://lists.rootsweb.ancestry.com/>).

4) Chronicling America (<http://ChroniclingAmerica.loc.gov>) -- Directory of all U.S. newspapers published from 1690 to the present. Over 2,014 newspaper titles digitized, 1836-1922, but not all issues of every newspaper (over 10.7 million pages digitized). Advanced search engine permits Select by State, Select Specific Newspaper, Select Year or Date Range.

3) Google (www.google.com) – Web Search; Images (<https://images.google.com/>); Scholar (<https://scholar.google.com/>); Maps (www.google.com/maps/); Sites (<https://sites.google.com/>); YouTube (www.YouTube.com); Blogger (www.blogger.com); Translate (<http://translate.google.com>); News Archive (<https://news.google.com/>); Books (<http://books.google.com>); Drive (Docs, Sheets) (<https://drive.google.com/>); Photos (<http://photos.google.com>); Gmail (<https://mail.google.com/mail/>); Google Plus (<http://plus.google.com>); Earth (www.google.com/earth/).

2) Find A Grave (www.FindAGrave.com) – 145 Million Memorials, many with gravestone photos, some with vital record information, biographies or obituaries. Has a primitive search engine, users can search by name, location, birth/death years, with a specific cemetery. Registered volunteers can create memorials, upload photos, etc. Registered users can request photos. They have a mobile app for iOS/Android.



Research Group Meeting Review – 13 April 2016

The April 13th meeting of the CVGS Research Group had 15 attendees. In the first hour, Randy discussed:

- * MyHeritage book matching technology is now available for researchers with a family tree on MyHeritage. The technology searches over 447,000 published books and periodicals for a user's tree persons. The matches are in the "Compilation of Published Sources" collection in Discoveries > Record Matches.
- * The New England Historic Genealogical Society website, www.AmericanAncestors.org, is free to search all databases through 20 April 2016.
- * CVGS member J. Paul Hawthorne created a Facebook firestorm by creating a 5-generation pedigree spreadsheet showing birthplaces rather than names, and coloring the backgrounds for specific states or countries. Members who want to do this can contact Randy at rjseaver@cox.net.
- * Ancestry.com has a Homestead Records database for six states now. Randy showed the documents for one of his relatives.
- * Ancestry indexing of their 50 state probate record databases is incomplete - users should also browse the records even if a search provides a result. Start with an Estate index.
- * Randy received 28 document images of Bristol County, Mass. probate records for his Kirby ancestors from a distant cousin, whose family had kept them for over 200 years.



In the second hour, the attendees discussed:

- * Mary found her 3rd great-grandfather, Edwin Miller Schaeffer (1819-1889), in a Lancaster (PA) Historical Society document and in the Lancaster cemetery. She wants to find more information about him and the family in order to prove relationships. The group suggested probate and land records, and perhaps military pension records.
- * Virginia obtained an "Old World Wisconsin" book at a local book sale.
- * Gary's step-father died at age 95. He was Gary's hero. The family has an album with 95 photos of his step-father's World War II service flying B17s and other aircraft.
- * Joanna is not satisfied with the 23andMe presentation of genetic results, or the health questions.
- * Susi posted a family register document to her blog, and wanted to know how she should transcribe it. The group suggested a four-column word processing table.
- * Shirley noted that her FamilyTreeDNA matches are difficult to contact and few respond.
- * Carole wants to download a GEDCOM file from her Ancestry Member Tree, and send it to a cousin, but without living persons. The group suggested using the free RootsMagic program to exclude living persons while creating another GEDCOM file to send to the cousin.
- * Esther's family was from Spain and Mexico, but some brothers were born in the 1930s and worked on the railroads, and then went to Mexico. She is looking for more records for all of the family members.
- * Diane found a birth record for her husband's ancestor, Juan Bautista Godinez, in the Mexico civil Registration records on Ancestry.com, after 40 years of searching.
- * Karen S. called the Amite County, MS county clerk to obtain records for an ancestor, had a fantastic response, and received many copied papers.
- * Karen Y. learned to write her name in Viking runes on the PBS Nova website (see <http://www.pbs.org/wgbh/nova/ancient/write-your-name-in-runes.html>).

Genealogy Roadshow on PBS Starting May 17th

The third season of *Genealogy Roadshow* will be on Tuesdays, May 17th through June 28th at 8 p.m. On PBS. *Genealogy Roadshow's* professional genealogists - Kenyatta D. Berry, Joshua Taylor and Mary Tedesco - are matched with everyday people whose unique family claims are explored in each episode.

Among this season's mysteries: A man seeks to find out if he is descended from Boston's key founders; a woman explores connections to an ancestor's participation in the Manhattan Project; a couple hopes to recover the true story of their family pharmacy during Hollywood's Golden Age; and a woman learns of her family's involvement in the Trail of Tears.

Over the course of the series and from coast-to-coast, Berry, Taylor and Tedesco work with participants' anecdotal clues, documents and family heirlooms to reveal surprising turns and incredible personal histories, filling in lost family details and in some cases, introducing them to relatives and other important people they never knew existed.

These 90-minute webinars are FREE to watch live at 11 a.m. Pacific time and for seven days after the live presentation on the website. After seven days, they are added to the Webinar Archive behind the Family Tree Webinars pay wall (\$49.95 for a one year subscription). There are over 340 webinars available in the Archive now. Most of them have an accompanying handout available only to subscribers. This is one of the best genealogy education bargains around.

Attendees got a bonus - ten more FREE websites with great genealogy information. The refreshments were excellent - thank you to Shirley Becker and Marcia Mautner.

Special Saturday Program Review – Mark Olsen

Mark Olsen, the Business Development Manager at MyHeritage presented “**MyHeritage – Amazing Technology Changing the World of Genealogy**” to about 40 members and guests on Saturday, April 30th, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., at the Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library Auditorium (365 F Street in Chula Vista).

Mark briefly described the history of MyHeritage from the 2003 start in Gilad Japhet's garage in Israel to the second largest commercial genealogy family tree and records website today. In 2011, they acquired WorldVitalRecords, and in 2012 they acquired Geni.com.

MyHeritage has developed several amazing technologies for facial recognition, matching users to other users, matching family tree persons with records, newspaper articles and book, etc. The amazing thing is that the Matching technology is 97.6% accurate.

Mark played one of the MyHeritage videos, this one made in Norway, where people on the street walked up to a computer screen, entered their name, their parents and grandparents names, and were presented with more family names, photos and stories.

On the MyHeritage website, Mark walked us through creating a new family tree on MyHeritage – entering data manually or using a GEDCOM import – and immediately receiving **Smart Matches** (matches your tree persons to tree persons in other user trees), **Record Matches** (records for persons in your family tree), and **Instant Discoveries** (more persons, photos and records from other user trees).

Other technologies developed in recent years include:

- * **Newspaper Matching** -- provides Record Matches for your tree persons from digitized newspapers.
- * **Record Detective** - Finds other records for the person you found a record for
- * **SearchConnect** - finds other users who searched for the same persons you are searching for.
- * **Global Name Translation** - searches across 42 languages for similar names, especially when searching for Jewish and Eastern European records.
- * **Book Matching** - finding matches with your tree persons in over 447,000 genealogy and family history books in the "Compilation of Public Sources" collection. Anyone can search this collection for FREE (without a subscription).
- * **Community** - Users can ask for help for translation, for record interpretation, etc. from other MyHeritage community members.

Mark said that MyHeritage has partnerships with FamilyTreeDNA and 23andMe for DNA testing, with NewspaperARCHIVE for newspaper content, with ArkivDigital for Sweden records, with Billion Graves for cemetery records, with RootsMagic for WebHints, and with FamilySearch for sharing records and technology. In addition, MyHeritage provides free desktop genealogy software called Family Tree Builder, now in Version 8 for Windows and Mac computers. Family Tree Builder 8 can synchronize your software family tree with your MyHeritage tree.

MyHeritage also has a MyHeritage Library Edition for free use at libraries and FamilySearch Centers. There are MyHeritage mobile apps for iOS and Android smart devices, including audio recording of memories that can be attached to a person.

MyHeritage retail yearly costs are \$119 for a no-limit family tree subscription, and \$119 for a Data subscription. There is a Premium Plus yearly subscription for \$238, but often there are special offers available.
