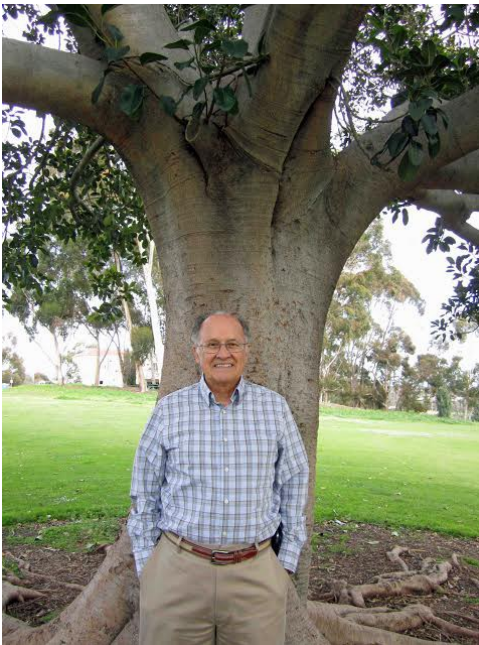

WorldCat ([www.worldcat.org](http://www.worldcat.org)) is a great web site to find out if a local library has the book I am interested in. If the book is really pertinent to my research, I will buy the book. Google Books (<https://books.google.com/>) is a great place to start. However, my favorite book web site is Abe Books (<https://www.abebooks.com/>). Abe Books is a consortium of bookstores. As a result, you can find used books at great prices as well as hard-to-find books. There are even sites to order dissertations (ProQuest Dissertations). I have found some great genealogy books and history books about the areas where my ancestor came from.

## Lemon Grove February Meeting Review -- Cindy Cox Teysko

The group met at the Lemon Grove Library on Wednesday, February 15. Some were missing due to illness, so the rest of us covered what we could.

Susi taught us why some of her Hoffman ancestors spelled their name Huffman. In German, the name is pronounced “who-f-man” with the first syllable sounding like the English “hoof”. So it seemed reasonable to spell the name with a ‘u’ rather than an ‘o’. I personally think they misspelled the name to confuse future genealogists, but that’s just me.

We discussed a new DNA testing company, Living DNA (<https://www.livingdna.com>). The website states they have the “most advanced DNA test offering with twice the detail of other ancestry tests”. The ancestry results include 80 worldwide regions with 21 regions in Britain and Ireland. The cost for the test is \$159. Here’s a fun fact: According to their website, Living DNA introduced their product at RootsTech 2017 and was so well received that they sold out!

Our long-time friend Clayton shared an interesting publication, “The New World Book of McDaniels” (1998). It is a cross between ‘Genealogy for Beginners’ and ‘The McDaniel Family in History and Around the World’, including the family coat of arms and a “McDaniel International Registry” listing numbers of McDaniels by country and specific individuals by U.S. state. There is also a list of mailing addresses of various archives, and genealogy and history societies in Europe, Canada, and the U.S. where ancestral records can be found. For computer users, it would be easier nowadays to search locations online for up-to-date addresses and online access to records.

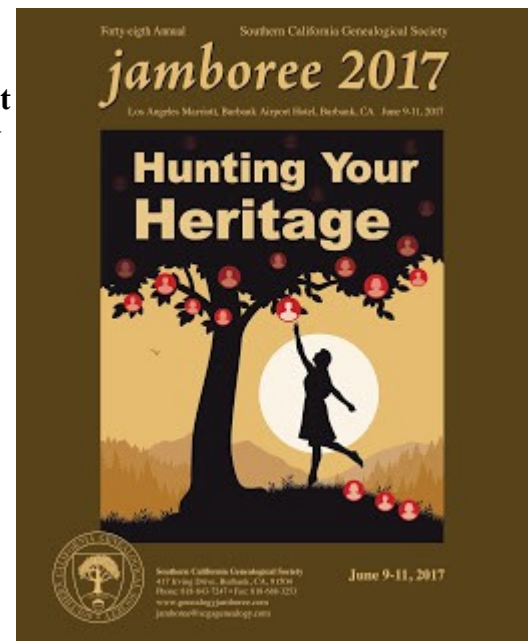

## February 8<sup>th</sup> Research Group Review – Karen Yarger

**The February 8 meeting of the CVGS Research Group had 14 attendees in the Auditorium. With Randy Seaver at RootsTech, Shirley Becker stepped in to moderate.**

**In the first hour, Shirley showed us the advantages of using Facebook to aid in our research.** Facebook members can take advantage of their Groups, such as “Maine Genealogy” or surname groups. Using her own genealogy as examples, she logged in to Facebook, then typed “New York genealogy”, then narrowed her search to “William Wright”. By posting a query on Facebook, she received a response the next day with an obituary for Mrs. William Wright, Orilla Wilson, daughter of Ruben Wilson, whom she’d been searching for for 30 years! She also introduced us to the site <http://clancywrightgenealogy.org/>



**In the second hour, group members discussed their research problems and successes, including:**

- \* Arlene has compiled six generations of death data, but is trying to verify information on her great grandfather Levi. A census showed that he was a merchant in Texas, but might have died in Louisville, KY.
- \* Wanda continues to trace her family in Iowa and Norway, and her Odell family to 900's England.
- \* Jean has a 'hole' in her 5-generation chart for Hannah Runyon, whom she believes may be descended from the French Huguenots.
- \* Shirley continues to work on her Wright family, but has an 1800 brick wall for Daniel Miller in New York. She is also searching for the parents of Thomas Graves in Oneida, NY.
- \* Susi shared the free site [www.genealogywise.com](http://www.genealogywise.com) as a good resource, also found on Facebook. It also has geographical and surname groups – she and Shirley have posted “Wright” and received useful information.
- \* Helen has had a DNA match in her Kaplinger (also Keplinger) family with someone in Norway.
- \* Mary's family DNA shows a British/Scottish connection with a Winkle family (a winkle is a snail in Britain). It's possible that 'man' was dropped from the German Winkleman.
- \* Virginia also had a DNA match with her Ardman line, which could be Erdman from 1800's Germany. She is having trouble with a family group sheet that has either 12 or 23 children.
- \* Sam's trip to Tennessee continues to provide information. He saw a Hardin memoir, which he then found in <https://www.worldcat.org/>, and is now able to transcribe.
- \* Karen discovered an audio cassette made by her maternal grandmother just before her 94<sup>th</sup> birthday (she was born in MD in 1899). In it she tells of seeing the Great Baltimore Fire of 1904 (the third largest conflagration in U.S. History), many family anecdotes about life on the Chesapeake, and stories about her grandmother's grandmother (Medora Travers Dill, 1843-1926) and her own mother's childhood. A family history treasure.
- \* Savannah, our newcomer, was excited to receive tips on how to start her genealogy research. She'll print all the charts she'll need to help in her research of family names Saganaga and Meijia. She knows her father John was from Chihuahua and one of 16 children. She looks forward to putting a tree online now that she knows about RootsWeb and other sites, and that we are ready to help her.
- \*\*\* While we met, the librarian came in with a donated baby book for a Lorraine Frances Gandee, born August 17, 1958 in L.A. We were amazed at the complete record, including birth certificate and school records. Sam Seat will research her information to determine how best to use or disburse the book.

## **Bernice LaRocque Heiter (1923-2017), CVGS Life Member**

Bernice LaRocque Heiter, 93, of Chula Vista, passed away on Friday, February 10, 2017. She was born in New Bedford, Mass. on December 13, 1923. She graduated from New Bedford High School in 1941 and received her Nursing Degree from Saint Luke's Hospital School of Nursing in 1945.

She worked as a Nurse in the United States Army where she met and married William Frank Heiter in 1951. After moving to San Diego, Calif., Bernice received her Master's Degree in French Literature from San Diego State College (SDSU) in 1976. She was a member of the Chula Vista Genealogical Society and volunteered for the San Diego Chapter of the American Red Cross for nearly 50 years.

Her greatest passion was helping people. She is survived by her children, William J. Heiter and John P. Heiter; her grandchildren Kara L. Heiter, John J. Heiter, Shannon Heiter, and Brandon Heiter; two great-grandchildren; sister Claire Vanasse; and two beloved cats.

A Celebration of Life was held Tuesday, 28 February. Bernice will be interred with her late husband at Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery.

Bernice was a founding member of the Chula Vista Genealogical Society, and was a Life Member. She served the Society as President, Treasurer, Newsletter Editor, Beginning Genealogy Teacher, Librarian, Glen Abbey Cemetery Project Leader, and frequent Speaker. She had a French-Canadian ancestry and was published in French-Canadian genealogy publications.

- **Photo Darkroom:** Elegantly simple editing tools. Powerful but easy to use tools that in just a few clicks can take an old photo faded beyond recognition and restore it to look like new.

## **Who Do You Think You Are? Series on TLC Starts on 5 March**

We regularly use libraries and archives close to home, but how do we access such resources in a foreign country? Although the internet has made it easier to reach genealogists on the other side of the world, we still face challenges in knowing what resources are available "over there", and how to communicate with others who do not speak English. Online translators allow us to translate between quite a few languages and English, so that interacting using the rudiments of another language is not as difficult as they used to be. Even if your grammar is not perfect, you will be surprised to find how understanding a phone call or an email recipient can be as you try to communicate with him in his native tongue.

Colleen Fitzpatrick, PhD, is an internationally recognized forensic genealogist, the founder of Identifinders International. She has been involved in high profile forensic cases, As a world traveler and multi-lingual, Colleen specializes in international cases; she has researched in over 50 countries and has lectured widely in the US, Canada, Europe, Australia, and New Zealand. She has appeared in hundreds of domestic and international newspapers and magazines, and on international radio and television programs.
