John Finch on “World War I, the Centennial”

Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library (365 F Street, Chula Vista, CA 91910)

John’s topic, “World War I, the Centennial,” examines the players and causes of the War, impact on all populations, and the unstable peace that followed the cessation of hostilities. A display of the various military and other records and documents will be presented which, hopefully, will aid in your research pursuits of this era.

John has been a member of the Chula Vista Genealogical Society since 1999 and has served as Library Coordinator, Program Chair and President (2004 -2006 term). He is also a member of the Lee County, Illinois and San Diego Genealogical Societies. He retired from U.S. Navy in 1980, and the San Diego County Probation Department in 1999.

John developed an interest in his own family history at a very young age, but did not begin an active pursuit of research until after retiring in 1999. Now, he spends several hours each week researching his family and volunteers, at the Chula Vista library, every Wednesday morning to assist new and seasoned researchers.




There will be a short CVGS business meeting and refreshments after the presentation.

President's Message – by Ceasar Castro



Before I started my genealogy research, my mother had told my sister and I that her grandmother, Vicenta Marquez on her father's side, was an Indian. When I did my DNA through 23andMe, I was not surprised that I was 12% Native American. My mother was born in El Alamo, Baja California Norte, which is about 60 miles south-east of Ensenada. In 1890, gold was discovered in the El Alamo region. My mother's father, Manuel Chavez came up from Baja California Sur to look for gold. It turns out that there is an Indian village, Santa Catarina, just north of El Alamo. That village is part of the Kumeyaay nation. I thought that perhaps Vicenta could have been a member of that village.

This past January, Sycuan opened a Sycuan Cultural Center and Museum in Dehesa Valley. I decided to go there and see if they knew anything about the Santa Caterina tribe. I was able to talk to Ana Rodriguez, the Cultural Coordinator and asked about the Santa Caterina village and if there was a way to determine if Vicenta was a member of that tribe. She said that I would have to go to that village and ask the elders if a Vicenta Marquez was ever a member.

However, before I did that, I decided to do a little more research on Vicenta and Manuel. After researching Baja records, I discovered that Manuel and Vicenta had a child, Maria Zara Chavez in San Jose del Cabo in 1875. San Jose del Cabo is at the very southern end of Baja. So Vicenta is not a Kumeyaay Indian. Now I have a harder problem. Is Vicenta a Native American or not, and if she is, which tribe? I may never be able to answer those questions.

In your research, how many times have you come to what looks like a dead end? It is very frustrating but still a fun journey. Plus, I will still keep my eye open for any information on Manuel and Vicenta Chavez.

MyHeritage Is Now Offered at the Bonita Library

The San Diego County Library system no longer offers free access to the Library Edition of *Ancestry.com*; they have replaced it with free access to *MyHeritage*. The good news is - MyHeritage is available for in-library and at-home usage. Just think, you can access billions of historical records from over 48 countries with just your library card.

Just go to <http://www.sdcl.org/>, click on 'eLIBRARY' at the top, then "Research & Online Learning." Click on the gray bar that says 'GENEALOGY', then the little box "MyHeritage." That will pull up the screen for you to enter your library card number and PIN. And you're all set!

The group met at the Lemon Grove Library on Wednesday, March 15. We enjoyed a fabulous Powerpoint presentation by our own Carole Sobke entitled: "A New Family Tree to Plant, Or, How My Hobbies Have Branched Together."

Carole began researching her family in the late 1960's and has come a long way. Her great grandfather's brother, August Heilbron, emigrated from Lower Saxon, Germany, and made his mark in Sacramento when he had the Heilbron Mansion built in 1881. This beautiful home remains standing and has been placed on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places. It is currently at risk of being moved or demolished and no one interested in family history wants that to happen.

Now for the fun part. Carole has melded her hobbies of genealogy and button collecting together and wow, what a unique and creative idea! She has lovingly located many, many uncommon buttons to represent many of her ancestors by occupation, situation, or vocation. As you will see, Carole's ancestors were successful businessmen, socially active, and adventurous.

Here are some of the representations she shared: The gold rush (a pan with pick, shovel, & gold nugget button), immigrant (ship), brewing company owner (mug of beer), butcher (a rare steak), 1915 Panama-California Exposition director (souvenir), FreeMason (square & compass logo), banker (banknote), hotel keeper (hotel), tailor (tailor at work), teacher (open book), farmer (wheat stalks), orphanage founder (two children playing), rancher (man riding a horse). And this is not a complete list. We were very impressed with Carole's creativity and determination in finding these small treasures and making them a pictorial part of her family history. 

March 29th Annual Meeting Review, by Karen Yarger

Jeanette Shiel is a Board Certified Genealogist with deep family roots in New England, New York, and New Jersey. Her interest in her family history began when her grandmother showed her an old family bible inscribed with the name “J.P. Uline.” Jeanette told us how newspapers were an important part of life in America, from the propaganda of the Revolutionary War, through the industrial revolution of the 1850’s, and the eagerly awaited news of actions in the Civil War. In the Victorian era, scrapbooking was popular – and some of those saved articles may be the only record of an event in our ancestors’ lives.



Newspapers were the ‘social media’ of their times and carried more than just birth, marriage, and death notices. Golden nuggets of your ancestors’ daily lives can be gleaned from gossip, tax notices, business advertisements and more. Information on local politics, and church, military and school news can all provide additional data for your genealogy research and will help round out your family’s stories and time line.

Jeanette gave examples from her own research which gave us an idea of her ancestor John Peter Uline’s life and personality. She built a biography beyond his vital records with photographs and articles noting milestones in his life and career, including his activism in the Anti-Rent movement in 1849.

She gave us tips on how to find our ancestors in newspapers, searching by various spellings of names – even nicknames – or using specific events or locales. Her two-page handout listed various categories and websites we can use to search. Some resources may require a fee, such as county and state archives and universities, but others are free, such as the Library of Congress’s <http://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov/>, which has over 2,000 newspapers from 1789-1924; and <http://www.freewebpaperarchives.us/>; also check www.familysearch.org/wiki for each state.

Jeanette’s lively and informative presentation ended with her telling how our grandfathers would get a cup of morning coffee and sit down to read the newspaper from front to back. Now, she said, we get our news in so many other ways. But when asked for a show of hands of how many of us still do it ‘the old fashioned way,’ nearly a third of our group raised their hands! March 8th Research Group Review


The March 8th Research Group meeting had 15 in attendance. In the first hour, Randy reviewed what he learned and experienced at RootsTech 2017 in Salt Lake City, including:

* Family Tree Maker announced FTM 2017 will be available in March, and will have an improved and much faster user interface, an interface with FamilySearch databases, and an improved FamilySync with an Ancestry Member Tree, including one AMT can sync with FTM files on several computers.

* RootsMagic did not announce a release date for their update that includes a sync with an Ancestry Member Tree.

* MyHeritage announced two new features, Photo Discoveries and Tree Consistency Checker.

* The RootsTech 2017 videos are available at www.rootstech.org with the keynote addresses and selected classes on each day.



In the second hour, the attendees discussed their genealogy problems and successes, including:

* Diane was researching her Longhurst ancestors, and found that one of her relatives married Samuel Boone, the younger brother of Daniel Boone. She also asked "why did our ancestors migrate from one place to another?" The group suggested because of other family members, religious reasons, opportunity to work and own land, etc.

* Bobbie is working on her goal to find parents for Marguerite Baker, one of her great-grandmothers. Her cousin in Germany sent information that her parents were Philipp Baker and Barbara Batz who had several children, including Marguerite, before their 1853 marriage. Bobbie sent for and received the birth registry to verify the information.

* Carole is writing family stories, and has found that Frank Lockwood Renwick married Annie Smith in 1857, according to her father's obituary. She also found that there were seven suicides in the family.

* Jo Ann is trying to find the father of John Sadler in England. He may be a Martin Sadler.

* Jean worked all day after the 4 March workshop on her Hannah Runyon problem and didn't find Hannah's parents.

* Shirley found an obituary that verified her William Wright ancestor. She found more obituaries and articles about social activities in newspapers to connect some of her unknown Wrights to the family in New York. There are similar names in families two generations apart.

* Karen S. found Texas Land Grants that linked her great-grandfather to her grandfather's neighbors in Louisiana. Two of the 640 acre grants in 1885 were originally owned by a man who shared a deed with her grandfather's brother.

* Helen has been researching children in her father's ancestral families, there are lots of German names. She found many obituaries for relatives in Iowa.

* Sam couldn't find his 2nd great-grandfather or his wife in Tennessee after 1870. He found that the wife married again in 1891 using a Google search, and found a newspaper article for her death.

* Arlene wondered about the middle name of Hiram Bowles Morris. She found that Hiram's father married Lucinda, who had a brother named Holman Bowles.

Family Tree Maker 2017 To Be Available in April

Software MacKiev announced that Family Tree Maker 2017 has been delayed a bit, and will be available in April 2017. The new features include:

- **Family Search:** Searching, matching and merging. FamilySearch is integrated into FTM 2017 so you can get match suggestions automatically, search billions of free online records, and merge them into your tree.
- **FamilySync:** An upgrade from TreeSync. FamilySync is our version of the new technology replacing TreeSync. Families will love the new ability to sync multiple copies of FTM to one Ancestry tree.
- **Color Coding:** Tracing your past. Get organized and gain insights into your family history using our new color coding and filter tools with up to four colors at a time on a single person.
- **Photo Darkroom:** Elegantly simple editing tools. Powerful but easy to use tools that in just a few clicks can take an old photo faded beyond recognition and restore it to look like new.

RootsMagic 7 “TreeShare” With Ancestry To Be Available in Late April

RootsMagic has indicated that their new “TreeShare” feature, which includes synchronizing an existing RootsMagic database with a new Ancestry Member Tree, or synchronizing an existing Ancestry tree with a new RootsMagic database, will be available in late April. However, after the initial sync, the user will have to sync information for only one person at a time between RootsMagic and the Ancestry Member Tree. This updating of RootsMagic 7 will be free for RootsMagic 7 users.



SD Central Library Research Trip Review, by Karen Yarger

Did you notice that March had five Wednesdays? Traditionally, we have planned a field trip to a local genealogy library on those extra Wednesdays (there are three more this year – in May, August, and November). On March 22, nine of our members, led by John Finch, made their way downtown by car pool or trolley to the San Diego Central Library. There, we buried ourselves in the stacks of books and periodicals, hunting for those elusive historical records on immigration, vital records and more.



The Library's ninth floor contains one of the largest genealogical collections in the area, and free access to the library edition of www.Ancestry.com. Did you know you can forward an image to your email and print it from home? For those who want copies from book pages, you can photograph them, of course, but you can also use the copier there (just obtain a copy card, load it with a few dollars, and get a docent to help you use the copier. It's not as easy as it looks!).

Several of our members make occasional trips to the Library on their own. They know they can take the Blue Line Trolley from Chula Vista to the 'Park & Market' stop and walk two blocks south to the Library. The senior fare is \$1.25 one way. Or, drive your own car to the big lot across the street from the Library (only when the Padres are not at PETCO!), and pay \$5 for all day. Pay at the machines at the south end, then drive and park at the north end of the lot, just a few steps to the Library. The Library has underground parking, but after two hours it's \$1.25 for each 20 minutes (ouch!).

Be sure to visit the 9th floor's Hervey Rare Book Room, which houses a 4,000 year old cuneiform and other marvels. And stop in on the 8th floor to see the displays in the Sullivan Family Baseball Research Center – the largest baseball archive outside of Cooperstown. The gift shop and used book shop are other 'must sees.'

The Library is open 9:30 a.m. To 7 p.m., Mon-Thurs; 9:30 a.m. To 6 p.m., Fri-Sat; and Sunday from 12 noon to 6 p.m. It is one of 35 branches in the San Diego Public Library system. For more information, see <https://www.sandiego.gov/public-library/central-library>.
