John Finch on “Between the World Wars”

at Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library (365 F Street) in Auditorium

John’s topic, “Between The World Wars” will include an overview of World War I; an examination of the efforts to provide for a permanent peace (“The War to End All Wars”); the impact of the war on all populations and the failure of International Treaties that followed the cessation of hostilities.

A display of the various military and other records and documents will be presented which, hopefully, will aid in your research pursuits of this era.

John has been a member of the Chula Vista Genealogical Society for nearly twenty years and has served as Library Coordinator, Program Chair and President (2005 -2006 term). Born and raised in Idaho, he retired from the United States Navy in 1980, and the San Diego County Probation Department in 1999.



John developed an interest in his own family history at a very young age, but did not begin an active pursuit of research until after retiring in 1999. Now, he spends several hours each week researching his family and volunteers, at the Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library, every Wednesday morning to assist new and seasoned researchers.

Spotlight On A CVGS Member - Karen Hanson Yarger: Researcher and Published Writer

Karen Yarger, a CVGS member since 2010, is our “Secretary Extraordinaire” and has served in that position for many years with the Chula Vista Genealogical Society’s Board. In 2013, she was Co-Chair of the CVGS Spring Seminar, along with Virginia Taylor, with speaker CeCe Moore’s presentation of “Do Your Genes Fit? Discover Your DNA.” She has also presented a program of “Women Heroes of the American Revolution” at one of our general meetings.

Although Karen is one of the four Karens in our group, she is unique and stands out. During our three Family History Days in 2016, 2017, and 2018, she was in charge of publicity, kept detailed records of the event, and greeted people as they arrived. She has volunteered in numerous Society activities.

Karen Ann Hanson was born in Annapolis, Maryland, the daughter of a career naval officer, Ralph “Swede” Hanson and stay-at-home mom, Ann Hardy Hanson. In a military family, and then as a military wife, she has called home places as varied as Japan, the Azores, Alaska, Hawaii, and Laredo, Texas, and has visited many more. Karen is a graduate of Oklahoma State University. She has also been a teacher, counselor, director of volunteers for the Red Cross, and a published writer on topics such as Alaskan life and native Alaskan ivory carvings. She has called Chula Vista her home since 1984 when she moved here and became a travel agent.

Karen’s roots are Norwegian, Irish, and French Huguenot, with special focus on Maryland’s eastern shore. Her early genealogy research began when she found her father’s files and then a website created by her Maryland cousins about her Huguenot ancestors, <http://www.lecompte.net/>.

Karen is the rare CVGS member who has not delved into DNA. She says that for the moment she is comfortable with the extensive research that traces both of her father’s Norwegian lines back to 1704 and her Huguenot line to the 1600’s. She is interested, though, in eventually pursuing her daughter’s Yarger heritage, which may include some Choctaw.

Karen is a voracious reader and can often be found at our library. Her wide-ranging interests include the Iditarod, dollhouse miniatures, Hawaiian legends, the USS Midway Museum, old Hollywood films, and Southern fiction. She enjoys sharing these interests, so seek her out – she’ll enjoy hearing your stories.

Randy's Research Tip of the Month


Use www.WorldCat.org to find the nearest repository for a specific book. Enter the book title and/or the author and click “Search everything.” Select the book from the list, and scroll down to see which repositories have the book, with the distance from your zip code. Perhaps you can order it via Inter-library loan at the Chula Vista or Bonita-Sunnyside libraries.

January 16th DNA Interest Group Review

The third CVGS DNA Interest Group meeting was on 16 January at the Chula Vista Civic Center Branch Library in the Conference Room. 17 members were in attendance.

1. Randy demonstrated and discussed 23andMe for most of the meeting, including:

- **Ancestry Link has:** Overview, All Reports, Ancestry Composition, DNA Relatives, Your DNA Family, Neanderthal Ancestry, Your Mitochondrial Haplogroup, and Your Y-Chromosome Haplogroup.
- **Health Link has:** Overview, Health Reports, Health Predisposition, Wellness, Carrier Status, and Traits.
- **Research Link has:** Research Overview, Surveys and Studies, and Publications
- **Family and Friends Link has:** DNA Relatives, Your Connections, and DNA Comparison.
- **Ancestry Composition (Ethnicity Estimate) shows:** Continents (and regions) of your ancestry, with a colorful map; a Timeline for most recent ancestor of the region; Ancestry Chromosome Painting, with your 23 chromosomes with color-coding of your ethnicity regions.
- **DNA Matches** -- these are persons who have a DNA match of at least 7 centiMorgans (0.1 %) with you. The user can see the name; the estimated relationship; the DNA Match quality (shared cMs, number of segments, largest segment); and shared locations. The user can also see the Relatives in Common with the user (other DNA matches), and the chromosomes on which the DNA Match shares segments with the user. The user can select up to 5 other DNA matches to compare their chromosome segments in a chromosome browser. There is also a Message feature to invite the DNA Match to share their Ancestry reports.
- **Download DNA Match Segments** -- At the bottom of the DNA Match list is a link to "Download aggregate data" which will produce a .csv file that can be read into a spreadsheet. In a spreadsheet, the data can be sorted by chromosome and segment location to provide a list of DNA matches that the user matches in a specific chromosome number and location. These matching persons will likely have a common ancestor on that segment.



To keep track of his 23andMe matches, Randy uses a spreadsheet to list the DNA Match user names, amount of shared DNA in centiMorgans, the number of segments, if they have a tree, if they are in another set of DNA matches (like AncestryDNA or GEDMatch), and if he has added their line to his RootsMagic tree. He also uses the downloaded .csv file for the Relatives in Common DNA segments in a spreadsheet in order to identify distant cousins of himself and a known cousin in hopes to determine the common ancestor.

2. The second major topic was the Genetic Affairs (www.GeneticAffairs.com) AutoCluster program which can read a user's DNA Match list (currently for AncestryDNA, FamilyTreeDNA, and 23andMe) and create a cluster diagram along with a cluster spreadsheet. The information comes via email within ten minutes of the request. Each cluster indicates that the matches in the cluster share a common ancestor. Randy demonstrated it with his AncestryDNA matches.

CVGS January 30th Program Review

Annette Hubbell was the speaker at the January 30th General Meeting, with 27 members and guests in attendance. She presented her one-woman show in costume and in dialect on four historical women in “Warrior Women, Part 2.”

The first subject was Elizabeth Fry (1780-1845), who was a wealthy Quaker English woman who was called the “Angel of Prisons.” In her career, she started 500 libraries and encouraged smallpox vaccinations to women and children. Annette read several pages from Elizabeth's diary, and noted that she married in 1800 and had 11 children. She started her prison reform work in 1813.

Amy Carmichael (1867-1951) was the second subject. She was born in Ireland, and God called her to start a mission in Bangalore, India in 1895, helping girls and women in a sanctuary for prostitutes. She was called “Amma to Little Girls.” After a 1930 fall, she was bedridden with neuralgia, and wrote books in her later years.

The third subject was Anne Bradstreet (1612-1672), who was born in England and migrated to New England in 1630 with her family. Her father was Thomas Dudley, a Massachusetts Bay Colony governor, and she married Simon Bradstreet, a future Massachusetts Governor. She lived a life of wealth and nobility, and was a mother of 8 children and the first well-known New England poet. In 1660, the Bradstreet home burned, and the family lost all of their possessions.

Gladys Aylward (1902-1970) was called “Mother to Hundreds.” She was from London and wanted excitement and adventure in her life. After a lecture by a Christian missionary, she agreed to spread the gospel in China. She took a train through Europe and Siberia to China, and started an orphanage, and worked against binding the feet of young girls. The movie *Inn of the 6th Happiness* was made about her life.

CVGS January 9th Research Group Review


The January 9th Research Group meeting had 16 in attendance.

In the first hour, Randy discussed:

- Finding Your Roots on Tuesdays,
- Genealogy website rankings and benchmarks,
- the Genetic Affairs DNA match AutoCluster tool,
- his 10 Best research finds of 2018,
- the RootsTech 2019 livestreaming opportunities.

In the second hour, the attendees shared their activities over the past two months.

- Diane noted that one of the best resources on FamilySearch.org are Catholic Church records of Marriage Information. In Atenguillo, Jalisco, in 4 pages with facts written on a very readable form, it told about a prospective groom and bride giving their names, ages, birth locations, parents' names, and whether the parents were still living. In addition were four witnesses with their own names, ages, occupations, who told about the couple and whether they were related by blood or not.
- Paula-Jo's 92 year old husband was contacted by an 85 year old cousin because of Ancestry DNA. She was then reunited with her extended family after 50 years. After sending her all of the genealogy information, she has visited Maine where she discovered her family was from. And when Paula sent her a 4-generation family picture that included her grandmother and a great grandmother, that left no doubt. She looks exactly like her great grandmother.
- John noted that his four grandsons had done autosomal DNA tests, and mentioned that comparing the DNA of the Grandson's revealed the diversity that the "in-laws" contribute.
- Jo Ann gave AncestryDNA kits to her grandchildren.
- Ray is working on his wife's ex-husband's line (after all, he's the grandfather of her grandsons). He found lots of fertile new ground. And, he was intrigued by the coincidence that many of Larry's peeps are from Cleveland, the hotbed of Ray's domestic genealogical studies. In the interest of content, several of his ancestors were involved in the construction and, later, operation of the Panama Canal, which is fascinating reading.
- Bobbie did not accomplish her three genealogy goals for 2018, so she decided to continue two of the goals for year 2019. One (a brick wall) is to try to find the death and burial dates of her great, great grandparents, Adolph Pitre and Marie Beausoleil, who came to Waukegan, Illinois from the Montreal area in about 1870. She hopes to take a trip to Lake County, IL, this coming summer for local research. The second goal is to hire a professional genealogist to obtain a birth registration in Oberwern, Wuerzberg, Bavaria for her great, great grandmother, Margaretha Hoffman. She also hopes to find out if there are any Hoffman descendants in the area, because they plan a trip to Germany in June 2020.
- Gary is coordinating with his two first cousins found through DNA in hopes of finding his birth father.
- Gonzalo and Rosa went to Jalisco in Mexico and found records of his great-grandparents. Her nephew took a DNA test, and they are searching for a half-brother.
- Helen is helping a friend with her DAR application research.
- Susan hit paydirt on her Babcock family and Hall family.
