C) Randy's Work

1) I had a query from a distant Buck cousin, who was asking about the ancestry of Mary Buck (1730-1810), who married Amos Case in Sutton, Worcester County, Massachusetts. A probate record search for Mary (Buck) Case turned up a will for Samuel Buck of Sutton, written in 1760 and proven in 1761. Son Samuel Buck, Daughters Mary Case and Hannah Walker were named as heirs in the will. This Samuel Buck apparently came from the Woburn area in Middlesex County, Massachusetts. There were several Samuel Buck persons from the Woburn area, but none of them fit the death in 1761, including Samuel Buck (1682-1730) who married Abigail Wyman; Samuel Buck (1686-1778) who married Hannah Fowle (1690-1720); or some other Samuel Buck who died in 1761. I wrote this up in <u>Rabbit Holes With Randy - Which Mary Buck is Rebecca's Ancestor?</u>

I haven't solved the problem, although I don't think it was either of the two Samuel Bucks in Woburn in this time frame. Contrary to popular opinion, the Massachusetts birth, marriage and death records in Massachusetts town records do not provide every birth, marriage, or death record.

2) Realizing that I need more records that might add information to what I thought I knew, I decided to search for land records that might provide leads to the right Samuel Buck. Land records usually provide the residence, occupation and property description. FamilySearch has browse-only land record collections, including <u>Massachusetts Land Records</u>, <u>1620-1986</u>. Worcester County (1732-1881) and Middlesex County (1636-1871) are of major interest. I set up a word processing table to capture the pertinent details. My process for finding and recording the results for Worcester County are in <u>Rabbit Holes With Randy - Finding Land Records for Samuel Buck of Sutton</u>, <u>Massachusetts</u> (the table is messed up in the blog post because of Blogger limitations). I have not completed the Worcester deeds, and have not started on the Middlesex deeds.
