B) Recent Genealogy News

1) <u>The 1931 Canadian Census Is Now Online</u>. Library and Archives Canada digitized the census pages, and Ancestry has indexed them using <u>Handwriting Recognition Technology</u> (sharing the index with LAC and FamilySearch).

2) <u>RootsMagic Released Version 9.0.3</u>, correcting WebSearch for Ancestry, fixing errors, etc. Later, they released Version 9.0.4 and 9.0.5 correcting more problems.

1) <u>Introducing Reimagine: An Innovative Photo App by MyHeritage</u> – A Mobile App to scan whole photo album pages, create a photo image of each photo on the page, save it to MyHeritage Photos, and use MyHeritage Photo tools (repair, enhance, colorize) to improve the photos. After a free trial, subcriptions are \$7.99 per month, or \$49.99 per year.

4) Artificial Intelligence can be used to write articles, but AI tools like ChatGPT and Google Bard may not be accurate, especially concerning sources (there are many examples of AI tools making up book, legal, and other sources). Two of the best blog posts are:

C) Randy's Work

1) Used the MyHeritage "Reimagine" mobile app to scan photo album pages from four albums plus several single pictures. Wrote about it in <u>Rabbit Holes With Randy -- Scanning Album</u> <u>Photos With Reimagine</u>. Added about 350 photos to the MyHeritage Photos collection, enhanced and colorized many of them, then saved them to my desktop computer with captions as file names. I still have at least 20 more photo albums and hundreds of loose photos to scan.

2) Found a number of photographs and artifacts in the albums and loose photos that I don't recall seeing before. I wrote blog posts about several of them:

There are more Closet Discoveries to write about as time goes on.

3) Made a major effort, with help from my daughters, to clean out the boxes and papers on the floor of the genealogy cave, and the closet adjoining (which mainly held my daughter's premarriage stuff, family papers to be shredded, and genealogy books and papers, trying to separate stuff into keep, donate and trash piles. I made the decision to throw out all of my paper files for conference and webinar syllabi, plus CVGS newsletter paper copies, and the paper copies of ancestral probate and land records (which I have transcribed into RootsMagic and posted on my blog). I haven't touched the 70 family surname binders yet, but there is a lot of useless material in many of them (e.g., Ancestral File, IGI lists, book pages, periodical articles). I haven't done anything with 15 linear feet of the periodical collection (RootsTech, Jamboree and NGS conference syllabi, NEHGRegister, NGSQuarterly, The Essex Genealogist, American Ancestors, NGS Magazine, Family Tree Magazine, Internet Genealogy Magazine, SCGS Searcher, and SDGS Newsletters) from 1990 to the present (some runs incomplete). Many of these periodicals are now digitized online, but not all. Many of these need a good genealogy home – I would prefer to give all of the issues I have of a certain periodical rather than deal with them one issue at a time.

D) Group Questions and Challenges:

1) What "Treasures" have you found hiding in your photo and artifact collections? Have you asked your siblings, children oe cousins for family photos you don't have?

- Gail shared about finding her father's Army Air Corp WW2 "Pilot Log," and also her mother's "Pilot Log" from the 1930s, which she never knew about.
- Susi shared about receiving names of persons on photos from family contacts at a family reunion.
